SEPTEMBER MINUTES

The September 12, 2012 meeting was called to order at 7:31 p.m. by our club president Casey Villyard-N6TZE at the Linda Mar Fire Station in Pacifica. Self-introduction by the members and guests followed.

It was moved by Dave Lawrence-KF6TWW to approve the minutes as published in the *Coastside Communicator*. The motion was seconded by Bob Barbitta-W6LOG and unanimously passed by the membership present.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Club Treasurer Frank Erbacher-N6FG gave a report of the club's financials: \$382 in the General Fund; \$5,737 in the Repeater Fund; \$758 in the Digipeater Fund, and \$6,040 in the EOC/Public Service Fund. These individual fund totals add up to a club total of \$12,917.

Frank-N6FG reported that there are currently 86 members of CARC, including 82 licensed and 4 non-licensed. 65 are ARRL members. There are 1356 total years of experience with Rex-W6VJJ the longest licensed at 66 years.

Frank-N6FG paid himself \$39 for copying, mailing and publication of the *Coastside Communicator* newsletter. Bob-W6LOG moved that Mary Ellen Scherer-AJ6J be reimbursed \$33 for making copies of the draft bylaws for use at the membership meeting. The motion was seconded by Ed Freeman-KD6TWK and unanimously passed by the membership.

Frank-N6FG stated that the Club had received a copy of the August 2012 edition of *Nuts and Volts* from the San Francisco Amateur Radio Club and the August edition of *Short Skip* from the Santa Cruz County Amateur Radio Club.

The committee report was moved to the New Business section of the agenda.

OLD BUSINESS

October Officer Nominations – Frank-N6FG reminded the members that nominations for officers will take place at the Club's October meeting and encouraged members to run "for" versus "from" office.

OLD BUSINESS CONT.

November Dinner Meeting - Frank-N6FG stated that Dave Rinck-K6DMR would be taking over the planning for this function. Frank reminded everyone that the election dinner will be held at Nick's in Pacifica on Saturday, November 3.

Bob Barbitta-W6LOG mentioned that the Linda Mar Round Table Pizza is no longer in business so that the Club's "Pizza Meeting" will have to take place somewhere else next year.

NEW BUSINESS

Committee Chair Mary Ellen-AJ6J reported that a draft of the Committee's proposed bylaws had been sent to the membership for review and that the process of adopting amended bylaws would begin tonight and continue in future Club meetings until completed. Once the members present at the meetings have completed the adoption of proposed language for amending CARC's Constitution and Bylaws, the final completed packet will be sent to all members for approval. Mary Ellen-AJ6J also said that because the current bylaws require a vote of two-thirds of the membership for bylaws amendment, rather than just two-thirds of those actually voting, and because it's impossible to get that many of the members to respond period, whether positively or negatively, that once the proposed bylaws are sent out for approval, that non-response will be counted as an affirmative vote in order to reach the required two-thirds vote of the membership. So any member opposing the proposed new constitution and bylaws will need to cast an actual vote against their adoption when the time comes to cast a ballot on the issue.

It was recommended by Roy Brixen-KE6MNJ that the review of the committee-proposed CARC Constitution and Bylaws language proceed on a page-by-page basis, rather than paragraph by paragraph, and those present agreed to follow that procedure.

It was moved and seconded that Page 1 be adopted in its proposed form. During discussion, it was clarified that the date on page 1, the title page, would reflect the actual day, month and year the new Constitution and Bylaws are finally approved at a CARC meeting. With that clarification, the motion to adopt Page 1 was unanimously approved by the members present.

It was moved and seconded that the entirety of the proposed language on Page 2 be adopted. During discussion, it was recommended that the verbiage "hereinafter referred to as" be inserted after the open parenthesis and before the word "CLUB" in the first sentence of the Preamble. With that amendment, the entirety of the proposed language on Page 2 was adopted by the members present.

It was moved and seconded that the entirety of the proposed language on Page 3 be adopted. During discussion, Roy Brixen-KE6MNJ stated that he felt that a simple majority would be preferable to the proposed two-thirds vote language in Article I-F. After discussion the motion to adopt Page 3 in its proposed form was adopted with Roy casting the single vote against the motion.

It was moved and seconded that the entirety of the proposed language on Page 4 be adopted. During discussion, the motion was amended to add the words "death, removal," in Article II, Section 3 in the fourth line between the words "the" and "withdrawal." The motion was further amended to remove the words "two-thirds" in Section 4-A, since that language is already contained in Section 4-F. With those two amendments, the motion to adopt the language proposed on Page 4 was unanimously adopted.

It was moved and seconded that the entirety of Page 5 be adopted. After discussion, the motion was amended to change the "He" in the second sentence of Article III, Section 1-A to "He/she" to be consistent with the rest of the bylaws language. The motion was further amended to include the addition of "U.S." between the comma after "Newsletter" and the word "mail" in Article III, Section 3-A. The motion was further amended to correct the typo which consisted of a hyphen between "decide" and "all" in the third line of Article III, Section A.

There was further discussion on Article III, Section 1-A as to whether the proposed "and none other" was adequate or confusing. Recommended verbiage "and no other documents" was suggested in its stead.

Roy Brixen-KE6MNJ stated that he thought that a "simple majority" would be a more preferable bar for the removal of an officer than the "two-thirds" proposed language reflected in Article II, Section 4-F, since officers are elected by a simple majority vote. He further pointed out the inconsistency of the two-thirds bar in this section when compared to the simple majority bar being proposed for a dues increase in Article V on Page 7.

Mary Ellen-AJ6J said she thought the word "collected" in Article II, Section 4-E on Page 5 should be "counted," since the ballots could be sent to the Club Secretary in advance of the meeting by those not planning to attend.

Frank-N6FG stated that he thought a step was missing in the proposed procedure for removing an officer, Article II, Section 4. He said that the officer should have a chance to speak at a meeting before ballots are actually collected.

No vote was taken on the adoption of the proposed language on Page 5 as amended because more time for discussion is needed. The proposed bylaws review process will recommence at CARC's October meeting. It was suggested and agreed to by all that in order to avoid confusion, the proposed new language adopted by the members present would not be inserted into the current set of proposed bylaws until after the entire review process is completed.

MOTION TO ADJOURN

It was moved by Bob-W6LOG that the meeting be adjourned at 8:36 p.m. The motion was seconded by Frank-N6FG and passed unanimously by the membership.

ARRL UPDATE CONT.

EVERETT GRACEY, WA6CBA (SK)

Everett Gracey, WA6CBA, of Grass Valley, California, passed away on August 26. He was 90. In 1979, Gracey -along with Ken, K6HCP, and Jacqui Holladay -- founded Mirage Communications in Gilroy, California. After selling Mirage, Gracey founded RF Concepts in 1986. Both Mirage and RF Concepts sold and manufactured VHF and UHF amplifiers. After Gracey sold RF Concepts, he continued to lead the company's marketing team for the next six years. In August 2000, Gracey joined forces with LDG Electronics as its dealer representative and marking consultant. LDG manufactures and sells HF automatic antenna tuners. Gracey was also responsible for bringing Alinco Electronics -- a radio manufacturer in Osaka, Japan -- into the USA marketplace.

According to Gracey's daughter Sharon Heisey, Gracey helped NASA put Amateur Radio equipment in space. "He was instrumental in getting ICOM to donate an Amateur Radio for the astronauts to use while in flight [on the space shuttle] and talk to schools and hams from space," she wrote in an e-mail. "My father also donated amplifiers and antennas to NASA in Houston and to the Kennedy Space Center [in Florida]."

During World War II, Gracey fought in Europe with the US Army and was awarded the Bronze Star and the Silver Star for his bravery in Germany; he also received the Purple Heart. In civilian life, he was a big rig truck driver and author of three books: From Freight Trains to Airplanes, Buying and Selling Real Estate by Owner and My 20 Years of RV Adventures (reviewed by QST Editor Steve Ford, WB8IMY, in the February 1999 issue of QST -- you must be an ARRL member and logged in to the ARRL website to read the review).

Per Gracey's request, there will be no service or memorial. Instead, his ashes will be placed next to his wife Dorothy, who passed away in January. Everett and Dorothy Gracey had been married 71 years.

LAST MAN STANDING PRODUCER CANCELS SPECIAL EVENT


Due to concerns over perceived violations of Section

97.113(a)(3), Last Man Standing Producer John Amodeo, NN6JA, has cancelled the Last Man Standing Special Event




Station planned for October 28. Amodeo had applied for and received a 1×1 call sign -- K6T -- to use for the event that would have taken place on the show's set. Last Man Standing stars Tim Allen as Mike Baxter, KA0XTT. "Although the intent of the Special Event Station was to celebrate and promote ham radio, it might be interpreted as promotion for the show and that cannot be permitted," Amodeo explained. "While we are disappointed with the cancellation of what would have been a fun, one-of-a-kind event, I know that as a licensed amateur and producer of broadcast programs, compliance with the FCC rules takes precedence. We will find other fun ways to use our station and promote ham radio soon. Mike Baxter's fictitious station, KA0XTT, will continue to appear on the set of Last Man Standing, but the radios will remain silent." Last Man Standing begins its second season on Friday, November 2 at 8/7 Central.

SOLAR UPDATE



THE K7RA SOLAR UPDATE

Tad "We all shine on, like the Moon and the stars and the Sun" Cook, K7RA, reports: The average daily sunspot numbers rose this week from 56 to 81.3, while the average daily solar flux increased from 101.4 to 129.7. This increase is expected to continue over the next few days, with the solar flux peaking at 150 on September 28-29, then going to 145 on September 30-October 1, 140 and 135 on October 2-3, 130 on October 4-5, 125 on October 6-7, 120 on October 8, 115 on October 9-10, 120 on October 11, 115 on October 12-13, and 120 on October 14-15. It is then expected to rise to a peak of 150 on October 20 and 150 again on October 25-26, with the average solar flux on October 21-24 around 141. The average planetary A index declined from 7.4 last week to 4.3 this week. The predicted planetary A index values are 5 on every day through October 2, then 10 on October 3, 8 on October 4-5, and 5 on October 6-11. Look for more on the ARRL website on Friday, September 28. AMATEUR RADIO HISTORY THE WAYBACK MACHINE BY BILL CONTINELLI - W2XOY

In March 4, 1929, Herbert Hoover, the former Secretary of Commerce who had helped Amateur Radio during it's embryonic years, became President of the United States. Less than 8 months later, the Nation was thrown into the Great Depression. Stock prices fell 80%, the Gross National Product fell 50%, and unemployment was at 25%. It did not sound like a good time to waste money on a frivolous hobby such as amateur radio. And yet, the early 1930's was the period of the greatest growth in our history. From 1929's census of 16,829, amateur radio expanded 276% in 5 years, to a total of 46,390 in 1934. What was life like in our hobby 65 years ago?

QST was 25 cents per issue. One of the interesting columns in it was entitled "Calls Heard", which simply listed page after page of callsigns heard by various stations reporting in. Each month hams would scan the hundreds of calls listed, to see if their signals had been noticed. One of the callsigns listed was W2XAF, which was not an amateur station, but rather the shortwave relay of WGY, Schenectady. In fact, in the 1930's, there were so many broadcast stations with SW relays, that the Callbook listed them in addition to amateur callsigns.

Most of the ads in OST at that time were for components to construct your own station. Tubes, resistors and condensers (not capacitors), were displayed in full page ads. RCA and deForest were the dominant entities in the tube field. If you needed "A", "B" and "C" batteries, the Burgess Battery Company in Madison, Wis. could supply them. As the 1930's progressed, more companies appeared with kits or even assembled units. Hammarlund, then known as Hammarlund-Roberts Inc, made it's debut with the "AC PRO", an 8 tube superhet receiver. National's new receiver was the SW-3. Radio Engineering Labs, known as REL, of Long Island City, supplied low cost transmitter and receiver kits. In 1931, one of these kits was at the center of a legal battle that went all the way to the Supreme Court. RCA, which held the deForest patents on the regenerative circuit, sued REL. Edwin Armstrong, who actually invented regeneration, but lost a controversial court battle with deForest, saw this as an opportunity to win back his patent. He purchased 51% of REL's stock, and proceeded to fight the grand battle once more. Unfortunately, in 1934, the Supreme Court ruled that deForest, not Armstrong, was the inventor of regeneration.

Armstrong could take some small consolation that another of his inventions was finally put to good use in the amateur world -- superregeneration. Invented in the early 1920's, superregeneration provides very high sensitivity on AM signals. However, it has almost no selectivity, a very high noise level in the absence of stations, and radiated a broad interfering signal to nearby receivers. It was useless on MW or SW, but was perfect for the 5 meter band at 56 mc. During the early 1930's, Ross Hull, QST's Associate Editor, wrote many articles about 5 meters and the surprising propagation there. Many 'phone stations appeared on 56 mc, almost all used "supergenny" receivers, and some even operated full duplex.

If "UHF" 'phone doesn't interest you, how about amateur television? In 1931 you ask??? Unbelievably, the answer is yes!. In 1931 an article appeared in QST describing the

"spinning disc" mechanical television system that had been around since the 20's. It was clumsy and crude, but it worked. The Jenkins Television Corp of Passaic, NJ, offered a "spinning Disc" kit in QST. Within 9 years however, the mechanical system was rendered obsolete by RCA's all electronic system.

The Madrid Conference was held in 1932. Unlike the 1927 Washington Conference, amateur radio was not in danger, and no frequencies were lost. 1932 also saw the expansion of the 'phone bands, but a special endorsement was needed to operate them.

The "Old Man" was still around, with his letters in QST about "rotten" operators, "rotten" band conditions, "rotten" stations, etc.. In fact, everything that didn't meet the Old Man's standards was "rotten". For the past 15 years he had been writing--no one knew who he was. Finally, when Hiram Percy Maxim died in 1936, the ARRL revealed that Maxim was indeed the Old Man. By the way, since H.P. Maxim, W1AW, was still alive in the early 30's, the ARRL Station Call was W1MK.

Dealers included "Uncle" Dave Marks, whose first store was located at 115 North Pearl St in Albany, NY. This address is significant to me because the building I now work in stands on that site.

By 1934, the Federal Radio Commission was superseded by the FCC, and a new license structure, with Class A, Class B, and Class C licenses, was in place. <<Class A, Class B, and Class C?? What goes around, comes around.

In our next installment, we will take a look at the late 1930's, particularly some events in 1938. I hope you can join me.

Packet Digipeater: 145.050 MHz, Packet Node: PAC APRS Digipeater: 144.390 MHz.

CARC/Pacifica OES VHF Simplex: 146.535 MHz PL Tone: 114.8 Hz is used, as needed, for noise suppression

VHF Net

The club sponsors a VHF net each Wednesday, with the exception of meeting nights, at 21:00 hrs. for membership check-ins, notices, and QST's. Note: The WA6AFT repeater on 440.725 MHz may be used as an alternate if the WA6TOW repeater is down.

HF Net

The club sponsors a HF rag chew net on 3.852 MHz, or the first clear frequency up/dn, on Saturday at 09:00 hrs. with an alternate frequency of 7.228 MHz.
